Crystal


Crystal is one of more than a dozen Virginia Garcia patients who have shared their stories to help legislators understand why health insurance is so important for everyone.

Crystal went for years with an untreated autoimmune disorder, similar to lupus, because she lacked health insurance. Once the Affordable Care Act expanded access to Medicaid, she signed up for the Oregon Health Plan and became a patient at VG's Hillsboro Clinic.

Her provider at VG immediately referred Crystal to specialists. The autoimmune disease affects her main organs, causing them to become inflamed. Now, she has specialist for her lungs and her heart. A single mom, she has made a life for herself and her two young children as a caregiver for the elderly. Her health problems and her 6-year-old son's vision and developmental disabilities have added a level of complexity to her life.

If she lost Medicaid, Crystal said she couldn't afford health care. "I could go into heart failure. My kids would end up in foster care. I know what that's like. [For me] it was a horrible life."

Living Well with Diabetes

Before he joined Virginia Garcia's diabetes program, Luis frequently ate a bowl of menudo with 24 tortillas. He drank heavily and smoked. His AIc level (blood sugar) was 14.

Luis's diabetes was out of control (Al c greater than 9 is uncontrolled), but he didn't understand how to improve his blood sugar level. Now he does. Through Virginia Garcia's new diabetes management program, Luis attends group diabetes classes at our Newberg Clinic, he works with a behavioral therapist, a dietitian and a clinical pharmacist as well as medical providers.

With the support of his VG team, Luis has lost nearly 60 pounds, he walks 20 minutes a day, stopped drinking and chews nicotine gum instead of smoking. His AIc dropped from I4 to II and is continuing to fall.

Diabetes is a growing and stubborn challenge. About 3,600 of Virginia Garcia's patients have diabetes and for 1,200 of them it is uncontrolled. We are expanding our diabetes program at each clinic to empower and support our patients who are ready to make changes.

9th Annual Health Care Symposium

"Women & Children First" brought together more than 300 people in a town hall format to ask questions of experts in advocacy, health care and politics about what the future holds for women and children in Oregon.

The panelists fielded questions about reproductive rights, domestic violence, geriatrics, immigration, transgender issues, affordable housing, affordable healthcare and education.

Virginia Garcia Clinica de la Mujer

Six-months pregnant, Consuelo was thrilled to learn that Virginia Garcia was opening a Women's Clinic. She experienced first-hand the crowded conditions at VG's Hillsboro Primary Care Clinic where she received her prenatal care. "The opening of the new clinic was very exciting," she said. Her son, Moises, is now two-months old and Consuelo takes him to the clinic for his well-baby checkups, along with her two young daughters for their checkups also.

Virginia Garcia offered OB services to its patients for years, serving hundreds of pregnant women annually. In many cases, their prenatal appointments represent the first time they visited a doctor. With the ever-growing demand for medical care, our OB and primary care no longer fit in the same clinic. We opened the Virginia Garcia Women's Clinic in May 2017. This ground-breaking clinic allows us to enhance the programs we currently provide as well as offer services in-house that we used to refer to other clinics such as breast health services, family planning and post-partum support.

Staff Highlight: Rosa Rivera

For the past 12 years, Rosa Rivera has overseen outreach to migrant camps for Virginia Garcia ensuring farmworkers and their families get the health care they need. As she walks among the people lined up for assistance they greet her like an old friend. She has watched their children grow up and has helped their families through many difficult situations over the years. This work is the heart of VG.

Rosa is on VG's Outreach team, making sure all of our patients have access to care. People working in the fields all day and often without transportation to town have limited ability to get care. Our medical van brings care to dozens of migrant camps, nurseries and low-income apartments.

Away from the camps, our Outreach team works to remove barriers to health care by providing services such as health insurance enrollment, parent education classes and, when needed, offering clothing and other basic necessities.

The program is funded in large part by donors who give at our annual fundraising event Grape Adventure, co-hosted with REX HILL Winery. Your calendar is already marked below - we hope you will join us this year.

Patient Advisory Councils

We believe in the worth and value of all of our patients. One of the ways we show our respect is to ask their advice. By listening to the advice of our patient councils at our primary care clinics, VG is able to meet the needs of all of our patients.

The councils provide us cultural perspective VG might not have considered, views into chronic pain management we didn't see and suggestions about little things that make a big difference.

Every month, VG patient councils meet to offer suggestions about how to improve our patient services. "We see and feel the needs of our community," said Magda, a Beaverton Patient Council Member. "I joined the council to help make Virginia Garcia even better in the future."

They taught us that lobby chairs make a huge difference in comfort and support for people with chronic pain. They promote our programs, helping improve patient enrollment in MyChart. They helped us develop patient interaction training that we call..."Respect Me, Know Me, Teach Me, Show Me."



School-Based Health Center Sealant Program

Tooth decay seems like a small thing in the grand scheme of a child's life, but it can have deep and long-term repercussions if not caught early. It can affect what kids eat, how they look, how they feel about themselves, how they behave and how often they miss school.

For children who grow up in poverty, teeth are often at the bottom of a long list of unmet needs. That's why Virginia Garcia takes dental care to kids in school. Partnering with school districts in Washington County, we identify schools with large populations of students from low-income homes and set up mobile equipment to serve them on-site.


This year, our dental teams assessed the oral health of nearly 2,200 children in Beaverton and Forest Grove schools in grades 1-3 and 6-7 and provided protective sealants to 1,700 kids. Of the 2,200 children we assessed, 34 percent needed additional care in a clinic or urgent dental care. Research shows that in-school sealant programs like VG's can reduce cavities by 50 percent.






